

**BYLAW NO. 2017-5**

**A BYLAW TO REGULATE THE SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES WITHIN THE  
RURAL MUNICIPALITY OF CLAYTON**


The Council of the Municipality of Clayton in the Province of Saskatchewan enacts as follows:

1. In this bylaw the expression:
  - a. "public highway" shall have the meaning ascribed to it by *Highways and Transportation, 1997 Act*;
  - b. "motor vehicle" shall have the meaning ascribed to it by *highways and Transportation, 1997 Act*.
2. Signs indicating the maximum speed allowed shall be erected at the commencement of the speed zone area and signs shall be erected showing the end of the speed zone area.
3. The maximum speed allowed on a particular road are recorded on Schedules "A", "B" & "C", forming part of the Bylaw.
4. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this bylaw is guilty of an offense and liable upon summary conviction to the penalties provided in the general penalty bylaw of this municipality.
5. Bylaw 1/92 & 1/98 are hereby repealed.

**Schedule "A"**

No person shall operate a motor vehicle at a greater speed than 40 kilometers per hour on that portion of public highway within the hamlet of Danbury, Saskatchewan.

**Schedule "B"**

No person shall operate a motor vehicle at a greater speed than 50 kilometers per hour on that portion of a public highway described as follows: "Commencing at the point where the Canadian National Railway tracks cross the eastern boundary of the Town of Norquay, Saskatchewan on Range Road 2013".

**Schedule "C"**

No person shall operate a motor vehicle at a greater speed than 40 kilometers per hour on that portion of public highway from Highway 8 to the east boundary of the Organized Hamlet of Swan Plain.
